The Shulamite Woman

Where in the Bible: Song of Songs 1–8

Key Facts:

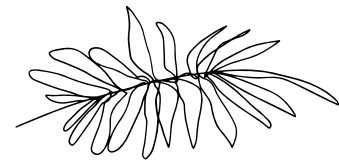
- The central female figure in Song of Songs
- Expresses deep, poetic love and commitment
- Represents devotion, desire, and longing for her beloved

Famous Verse:

"I am my beloved's and my beloved is mine."
— Song of Songs 6 : 3

Key Takeaway:

The love story of Solomon and the Shulamite woman give insight into the story of God's love for you and your love for the One who sees you as precious, beloved, and perfect in his sight.



Deborah

Where in the Bible: Judges 4–5

Key Facts:

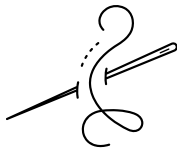
- Only female judge of Israel
- Led Israel to victory alongside Barak
- Known for her wisdom and courage

Famous Verse:

"March on, my soul; be strong!"
— Judges 5:21

Key Takeaway:

Deborah's faith, leadership, and humility inspire us to give God glory, showing what it looks like to lead with obedience and gratitude.



The Proverbs 31 Woman

Where in the Bible: Proverbs 31:10-31

Key Facts:

- Described as hardworking, wise, and generous
- Prioritizes her household while fearing the Lord
- A model of godly character

Famous Verse:

"Charm is deceptive, and beauty is fleeting; but a woman who fears the Lord is to be praised."
— Proverbs 31:30

Key Takeaway:

The Proverbs 31 Woman inspires us to live with noble character, leadership, and faith, offering a vision of who we can become through God's guidance.



Ruth

Where in the Bible: Book of Ruth (Ruth 1–4)

Key Facts:

- A Moabite widow who chose to follow Israel's God
- Known for her loyalty to Naomi
- Ancestor of King David and Jesus

Famous Verse:

"Where you go I will go, and where you stay I will stay." — Ruth 1:16

Key Takeaway:

Ruth reminds us that anyone can follow God and become part of his plan; we just have to stay focused and keep our eyes on the Creator and Savior of our souls.



Puah and Shiphrah

Where in the Bible: Exodus 1:15-21

Key Facts:

- Hebrew midwives who defied Pharaoh's order
- Risked their lives to save Israelite babies
- God honored them for their faithfulness

Famous Verse:

"So God was kind to the midwives... and gave them families of their own."

— Exodus 1:20-21

Key Takeaway:

Puah and Shiphrah give us a picture of honoring the King of heaven above any human leader.



Esther

Where in the Bible: Book of Esther (Esther 1-10)

Key Facts:

- Jewish queen of Persia
- Risked her life to save her people
- Used her influence with wisdom and courage

Famous Verse:

"And who knows but that you have come to your royal position for such a time as this?"

— Esther 4:14

Key Takeaway:

Esther's strength, boldness, faith, and influence make her a timeless model of courage and faith for women in every situation.



Priscilla

Where in the Bible: Acts 18:1-3, 18-26; Romans 16:3; 1 Corinthians 16:19

Key Facts:

- Early church leader alongside her husband, Aquila
- Helped disciple Apollos in understanding Jesus
- Opened up her home for believers to gather together

Famous Verse:

"Greet Priscilla and Aquila, my fellow workers in Christ Jesus." - Romans 16:3

Key Takeaway:

Priscilla was an ordinary woman who loved Jesus, sought to use her gifts, opened her home graciously, and enjoyed working in partnership with others.



Mary and Martha

Where in the Bible: Luke 10:38-42, John 11:1-44

Key Facts:

- Sisters of Lazarus and close friends of Jesus
- Each showed a different but equally valuable expression of faith
- Both played a role in Jesus' ministry

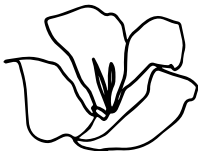
Famous Verse:

"Martha, Martha... Mary has chosen what is better, and it will not be taken away from her."

— Luke 10:41-42

Key Takeaway:

Mary and Martha were both confident followers of Jesus, each with her unique spiritual journey, yet united by deep faith and their close bond as sisters.



The Bent Woman

Where in the Bible: Luke 13:10-17

Key Facts:

- Afflicted with a disabling spirit for 18 years
- Jesus healed her on the Sabbath
- Her healing angered religious leaders but glorified God

Famous Verse:

"Woman, you are set free from your infirmity."
— Luke 13:12

Key Takeaway:

The bent-over woman's story reminds us that, like her, we come to Jesus broken and captive, and through His healing touch, our lives are transformed.



The Woman with the Issue of Blood

Where in the Bible: Mark 5:25-34;
Matthew 9:20-22; Luke 8:43-48

Key Facts:

- Suffered from a bleeding disorder for 12 years
- Touched Jesus' robe in faith and was instantly healed
- Jesus publicly honored her faith

Famous Verse:

"Daughter, your faith has healed you. Go in peace and be freed from your suffering." — Mark 5:34

Key Takeaway:

The woman with the issue of blood teaches us that when we boldly reach out to Jesus, He heals and restores us.



Elizabeth

Where in the Bible: Luke 1:5-80

Key Facts:

- Wife of Zechariah, mother of John the Baptist
- Became pregnant in old age as a miracle
- Recognized Mary's unborn child as the Messiah

Famous Verse:

"Blessed is she who has believed that the Lord would fulfill his promises to her!" — Luke 1:45

Key Takeaway:

Elizabeth's story reminds us that even in seasons of waiting and unfulfilled dreams, God is always faithful and can bring about unexpected blessings.



Anna

Where in the Bible: Luke 2:36-38

Key Facts:

- A prophetess who lived in the temple
- Saw baby Jesus and prophesied about Him
- Spent her life in prayer and fasting

Famous Verse:

"She gave thanks to God and spoke about the child to all who were looking forward to the redemption of Jerusalem." — Luke 2:38

Key Takeaway:

Anna's faith, devotion, and spiritual discipline show us how to navigate loss and recognize God's presence in our lives.
